What is PACT?

- Promoting Adolescents' Comprehension of Text (PACT) is a program that was designed to supplement existing American history courses and curriculum with evidence-based reading and literacy practices.
- PACT aims to improve literacy strategies in the context of social studies instruction, addressing three American history units (Colonial America, Road to Revolution, and Revolutionary War).
- PACT has been found to be effective with diverse learners, including English learners and students with and without disabilities and reading difficulties.
- In a number of prior federally-funded research studies, PACT shows prior evidence of effectiveness on social studies, reading, and literacy outcomes.¹

Who can participate in PACT-Local (PACT-L)?

• Districts that have schools teaching units related to Colonial America, Road to Revolution, and Revolutionary War in 6th-9th grade can participate in PACT-L.
