

Guide to Evidence-Based Clearinghouses

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), state educational agencies (SEAs) are required to identify schools in need of Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) or Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) as well as schools in any additional state-determined categories. The purpose of this guide is to provide SEAs, local educational agencies (LEAs), schools, and educators with information to assist them in using evidenced-based clearinghouses to help select and employ evidence-based practices, activities, strategies, and interventions. The guide can be used to access various clearinghouse sites, which in turn offer links, resources, and tools to support the important work of ensuring that all students have the opportunity to receive a quality education. Indicators have been added for the Clearinghouses that have been “AIR Vetted” and “Government Sponsored.” AIR Vetted means that AIR experts have reviewed the protocols of the vetted clearinghouses and have aligned their standards with the ESSA evidence tiers. The one exception to this is the Campbell collaboration, which is a clearinghouse for meta-analysis. Government sponsored means that the Clearinghouse is directly funded and/or sponsored by a branch of the Federal Government. Please note that finding evidence-based practices on Clearinghouse websites does not mean that it is an automatic fit for ESSA criteria and tiers.
