## **Prior to Incarceration**






## **Previous Employment**

3% Permanently disabled 1% Retired – / – 4% Student

Prior to their most recent incarceration, nearly half of incarcerated adults were employed full-time.<sup>1</sup>



## **Income Sources Prior to Incarceration**

The majority of incarcerated adults made money from paid jobs prior to incarceration.<sup>2</sup>

27%	Family or friends
23%	Illegal sources
8%	Social Security or other pension(s)

8%	Welfare or charity
6%	Other
4%	Educational scholarship or grant
3%	Unemployment insurance or workman's compensation
